

## **ROUGHAM HERITAGE SITES**

### **Pigeon house**

Built around 1695 by Roger North. There are 999 nesting boxes. Pigeon squabs (unfledged pigeon chicks) were a good source of food.

### **Church**

Tombstone of T. K. North shows the first aeroplane flight across the Atlantic. He designed the plane, a Vickers Vimy, but died in the flue epidemic just before Alcock and Brown's flight.

### **Lodge**

Built in about 1908 in the style of the Arts and Crafts movement. This movement called for attention to style and detail.

### **Kissing Gate to the Walks**

The lime Avenue lead up to the old Rougham Hall demolished around 1790. The Avenue was planted at the end of the 17<sup>th</sup> century by Roger North and it originally continued with Ash trees a further half mile to the South.

### **Telephone box**

These iconic telephone boxes were designed by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott.

### **Crown Public house.**

The Crown was a pub selling Greene King beer until the early 1960's

### **The Well**

The building was erected in memory of Marianne North whose dates are carved into it. It is about 30metres deep and provided drinking water for all the village.

Marianne North gains fame each year and a BBC film was made about her this year.

### **The Forge**

When Horses provided the power on farms many farms had forges to enable them to be shod. This forge was in use in living memory.

### **The School**

Until 1910 children went to school in what is now the village hall (always known as "The Old School"). This fine building was erected by F.K. North in 1911.

### **The Chapel**

The foundation stone was laid in 1877. The chapel was in use until 1990.
